

U.S.A. CUSTOMS DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS

If you are relocating or emigrating to the United States of America

- Resident Alien Card (if applicable)

If your shipment is an inheritance

- U.S.A. Customs Form 3299
- Supplemental
- Power of Attorney
- English Inventory (supplied by agent)
- Inheritance letter
- Passport letter
- Visa copy (if applicable).
- Resident Alien Card (if applicable)

If your shipment is a newly purchased furniture of antiques

- 3299 and Supplemental Declaration
- Commercial invoice / receipt (showing circa date if it is an antique).
- Power of Attorney
- Description of furniture, i.e.: type of wood, metal, etc made of

There is no guarantee that your shipment can be imported duty free. Most shipments of used household goods and personal effects can be imported duty free if you are relocating to the U.S.A. after being out of the country for at least one year. Inheritance shipments do not necessarily get duty free treatment. In general, antiques over 100 years old are given duty free preference. Newly purchased furniture is subject to duty. However, U.S.A. Custom can impose duty on any shipment at their discretion.

Please note: As the importer on record, you are responsible for paying all duties and fees that may accrue.
